Investigate the History of Your Profession and Win a Trip to England!

This is an *unusual* and *exciting* opportunity for an IEEE Student member of electrical engineering and computing to do some historical research and present it at an international IEEE conference in England, with travel expenses paid.

The 2004 IEEE Conference on the History of Electronics marks the one hundredth anniversary of the invention by John Ambrose Fleming of the diode electron-tube, the first of the radio tubes. The conference will take place from 28 June through 30 June 2004 at Bletchley Park, 50 miles northwest of London.

Submit a paper that investigates some topic in the history of electronics broadly defined, including, for example, computers, signal processing, control systems, and consumer electronics. He or she may focus on any aspect of this history—technological, economic, or social—and should present the research results and conclusions in a 10- to 20-page paper.
